Stolen Baby Jesus replaced

Father, son delight their neighbors in Rockaway Twp.

A Rockaway Township couple who had a treasured baby Jesus stolen from their front-lawn Nativity scene were delighted by unknown neighbors who replaced the plastic figurine on Christmas day.

Elaine and Mark Romito — whose pre-Christmas plight was reported first in the Daily Record earlier this month before New York TV news crews descended on their Daniel Street home — say a father and son appeared at their doorstep about 3 p.m. on Thursday bearing gifts, including an exact replacement of the Jesus figure they were so heartbroken to lose.

The father-and-son Samaritans also brought a brand-new motion-detector security system for the Romitos to install in hopes of preventing future loss

Popcorn Park haven for animals

LACEY — It began decades ago with a mistreated fawn and an injured raccoon.

Now, some 37 years later, a location in the midst of the Pine Barrens here continues to be a haven for animals of all kinds that have been abused, neglected, abandoned, injured, are sick or are otherwise unwanted or unable to be cared for at other facilities.

One might view the Associated Humane Societies' Popcorn Park Zoo in the township's Forked River section as an island of misfit toys for animals. But it also serves as an attraction for visitors who can get a closeup look at — and

Morris Plains bishop set to begin five-part lecture series

MORRISTOWN — Bishop John Shelby Spong, whose scholarly books on the Bible have sold more than a million copies, will begin a five-part lecture series at St. Peter's Episcopal Church Sunday.

The series marks the end of a busy year for the 83-year-old Spong, known as a key voice for progressive Christianity. In 2014, he traveled from his Morris Plains home to deliver 125 lectures, including three in Paris and one at the famed Chautauqua Institution in New York.

Of late, Spong's talks have explored themes from his latest book, "The Fourth Gospel: Tales of a Jewish Mystic" (HarperOne), released in paperback this fall. The book deals with the Gospel of John, the last of the four Christian Gospels to be written. It was penned circa 95-100

CE. On Sunday, in a talk called "Taking the Fourth Gospel Out Of Its Literal Prison," Spong will address the Gospel of John as an interpretive work and not, as it has generally been presented to Christians, an historical or biographical work.

"When you tell a story 40 to 70 years later, you don't tell it literally," Spong told the Daily Record, "but that doesn't mean it isn't true."

The Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke, called the Synoptic Gospels because they include similar stories and even wording, were written earlier than John's book. The Gospel of Mark was penned in 72 CE, some 42 years after the crucifixion of Jesus, Spong points out, while the Gospel of Matthew was written in 85 CE and the Gospel of Luke, 88 to 93 CE.
