During an interview Tuesday, the rapper-turned-renovator checked his phone and saw the latest ratings for his show are up 156 percent from this time last year.

"We're now the No. 1 show on the DIY Network," he said. "Who ever thought all this? I didn't plan on being a custom light designer. With the success of the TV show, and everything, it all evolved."

So how did Vanilla Ice—aka the Iceman, Ice, and VIP—go from working with M.C. Hammer to an actual hammer?

Back in the day "Ice Ice Baby" lyrics were all over the airwaves:

...Take heed, 'cause I'm a lyrical poet
 Miami's on the scene just in case you didn't know it...

But then came 18 years of experience in home renovation.

When his first album, "To The Extreme," released by SBK Records in 1990, shot to the top of the Billboard charts and sold 11 million copies, Vanilla Ice went on tour for three years ... and bought homes. According to the Internet Movie Database, he started with mansions in Miami and Los Angeles and a mountain cabin in Utah.

He sold them, made money, and then developed a knack for buying, renovating, and flipping houses. The knack turned into a passion. His experience is what led to "The Vanilla Ice Project," featuring him and his crew renovating mansions Vanilla Ice has personally

bought.

These days Van Winkle lives with his wife and two daughters, Dusti Rain and KeeLee Breeze, in a 14-bedroom, 15,000-square-foot home on Miami Beach's Star Island.

"I'm not a celebrity that they built the show around," he said. "I really do this. I get in there and get dirty with the guys and make renovations and build houses."

He has yet a third passion—charities. Active in the Make-A-Wish Foundation and Habitat for Humanity, he also created his own charity, the eight-year-old Vanilla Ice Holiday Block Party, an outdoor extravaganza that draws 35,000 people every Christmas to Clematis Street in downtown West Palm Beach.

"We have real snow blowing in Palm Beach, which is unheard of," Van Winkle said. "I put on a full concert for an hour and a half. Celebrities galore show up, from the Jersey Shore cast to Erik Estrada. It's a great time, and we raise millions of dollars for everything from Toys for Tots to children's hospitals."

Capitol Lighting, which has a total of eight locations in South Florida and New Jersey, is a major sponsor for the block party fundraiser.

Capitol owners—brothers Eric and Ken Lebersfeld—also worked with Vanilla Ice on the Making Lives Brighter campaign for Habitat for Humanity. People were encouraged to donate their old light fixtures to any Capitol Lighting store to be re-purposed for use in a Habitat ReStore or home. Store locations in New Jersey are East Hanover, Eatontown, Green

brook, and Paramus.

So when Van Winkle decided to create his signature chandeliers and wall sconces, working with Capitol Lighting was a natural.

"We're honored to have such a wonderful relationship with Vanilla Ice," said Eric Lebersfeld, Capitol president. "He is a true part of our team and brings a special eye for home design."

Vanilla Ice said he'll make his way around to Capitol Lighting in New Jersey, though an appearance isn't currently on his schedule. After all, he said, he likes New Jersey. Parts of his chandeliers are made in the Garden State and he gets all his tattoos here.

Van Winkle said he's already working on expanding his lighting line, for which he gained inspiration when he glimpsed the tie of a friend's father. The tie was covered in Swarovski crystals.

But why lights in the first place? According to Van Winkle, there are three reasons.

First, a chandelier is the first thing people notice when they walk into a room.

Second, a chandelier is a quick, easy upgrade in any economic backdrop.

Third, he said he's constantly choosing and buying lighting fixtures and saw a need for pieces that make a statement and yet complement any décor.

"I see all these different options out there," he said. "They look great in the showroom but they're so blinged out that, when you go put them in your house, they don't match your furniture."

His goal was to design luxury chandeliers with

bling that doesn't go over the top — a 28-inch version for an elegant dining room and a 24-inch version for a smaller dining room or breakfast area. They sell, respectively, for \$1,495 and \$995 exclusively through Capitol Lighting.

None of this means Vanilla Ice has abandoned music. He still performs and attracts crowds to clubs and thousands to concerts though things have calmed down from his younger days. His 2011 album, released by Radium Records, is called "WTF." But, he is quick to point out, the acronym stands for "Wisdom, Tenacity and Focus."

Van Winkle is now signed with Psychopathic Records, which is patiently waiting for him to produce but, he said, the label understands the demands of his cable show. Now, he said, also is a good time to be active in real estate because prices are low. In addition to several houses, he owns commercial real estate, condos, rental units, and vacant land.

"I've got so many things on my schedule that my music is on the back burner," Van Winkle said.

Truth is, though, he can't resist a good rap no matter what he's doing.

Even on "The Vanilla Ice Project," in jeans and a T-shirt, he'll break into rap:

*From the window to the wall,
 from concrete backboard to drywall,
 we do it all.*

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
